## *FÀILTE*

We have a slight problem regarding recruitment of new members.

It has been brought to my notice that Clan MacLachlan are advertising for new members in "The Highlander" and in "Scottish World", two magazines which enjoy a wide readership.

Unfortunately they include the name "MacEwan (all spellings)" erroneously, in their advert, thus implying that theirs is the society to which we should belong.

When I took up the matter with Roderick MacLachlan, the present secretary, he expressed himself unaware of the existence of a Clan Ewen Society. This, despite the fact that we shared a booth with MacLachlan in the Assembly Rooms in Edinburgh whilst attending the international gathering of the clans in 1981.

We also manned a booth at the international gathering in Glasgow in the MacLellan Galleries in 1985 wherein MacLachlan also had a booth.

Further, Clan Ewen was a member of the "Association of Clan and Kindred Societies" since its inception, as was MacLachlan.

The writer has had telephone conversations with Duncan MacLachlan of Paisley, a previous secretary of their society, so that it is difficult to understand how they are unaware of the existence of our society.

I have written to Roderick MacLachlan on this matter to remonstrate and he has expressed himself as having no intention of correcting his future adverts by omitting the plea to those with the name MacEwan. He claims to justify his action by stating that both clans emanate from a common ancestor.

I don't propose to debate this topic now as others of our society are about to do this - see Colin Davies' article in this edition, and that of Charles, our Vice-Chairman.

In an effort to correct MacLachlans advert you will shortly be able to read our own advert in both of these magazines.

Further, if readers of this Bulletin care to take up cudgels - "The pen is mightier than the sword" - and write to Roderick MacLachlan, pointing out how out of touch he is with reality and the fact that a Clan Ewen Society has existed since May, 1977, he might eventually be persuaded to "mend his ways". His address is appended below this article.

Once again we are approaching the end of another year. It seems like only yesterday since I last wished you all a Happy Christmas. Nevertheless as this is "the end of the year" Bulletin I take this opportunity, together with all members of the "head office", to convey to those who bear the name MacEwan (all spellings) throughout the world our very best wishes for an enjoyable Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year.

## ***RAISING RON EWING'S QUERY OVER CLAN MACLACHLAN***

Our early clan history, unfortunately, has been dispersed over the centuries. Although the line can be traced back through the female line to Anrothan (Anradan) O'Neill. Then back across the sea to Ireland and the Kings of Ailech fighting against the Norse Kings of Dublin.

For some hundred years or more, from the middle of the 12th century, through to the end of the 13th century the MacEwans were a clan of importance and considerable strength in Cowal. They held a large central tract of territory, stretching up from the east shore of Loch Fyne, across to Loch Asgog and as far as Tigh-na-bruaich, continuing up to Glendaruel and the hills west of the glen. Then in conjunction with the MacLachlan lands on the eastern shore of Loch Fyne, MacEwans are found up through Glenbranter, Lochgoilhead and as far north as Glen Croe, linking up with MacFarlanes at Arrochar.

MacEwan's cousins are MacLachlans on the left as far as Loch Gilphead and eastern shore of Loch Awe, through the Eredine Forest. The Lamonts on the right, across the southern half of Cowal to Dunoon and then down to Bute. They then move across to eastern shores of Loch Fyne and Kintyre, forming a solid barrier to outsiders between them.

Clans stemming from the same ancestral branch, often inter-married, as did all three, MacEwans, MacLachlans and Lamonts. Due to this fact, the name of Ewen as a sept of MacLachlan is correct. Ewen is also found amongst the Lamonts. McEwens were at one time hereditary bards to Campbell of Glen Orchy.

The Ewans are also a sept of MacEwans. Ewing can be found as a sept of MacMillans of Knapdale, who are also related to us. All three names, Ewen, Ewan and Ewing can be cadets of direct MacEwan descent. The Clans, Septs and Cadets of each Clan have all mingled together.

Our Clan history survives only in diverse fragments of heritage. The keepers of the clan heritage and glory are its bards, retaining vocally the history, bloodline and fame of its individuals. The Clan bards, along with

many of its warrior strength, died fighting for the Lords of the Isles against Alexander's conquest of Argyll expedition in 1222 circa. In the ensuing battle in MacEwan territory, the clan suffered critical casualties and never recovered from the blow. The Clan continued to survive in its Otter territory, eventually losing out to Campbell intrigue, who were forming a power base using influence on King to gain control in Western Argyll. Many clans lost out due to Campbells holding sway in government court and in the legal positions as Campbell was Lord Advocate.

MacEwans, however, are notable survivors, the spread of the clan bears witness to that fact. MacEwans have associations of kinship with many clans. As an example, one hundred and fifty MacEwans crossed with Maclean of Duart, from Mull, to join in the rising of 1715. We also took part, alongside MacKinnons, in the battle of Inverlochy with Montrose's campaign, fought in concert with MacMillans and MacLeans for Dundee at Killiecrankie. Some were at the battle of Worcester, with MacKinnons fighting for Stuart King.

Members of Clan also involved in revenge on Campbell as many Clans were, when Montrose's winter campaign ravaged lands of Clan Campbell. In the "45" though, only five were recorded as having come from the old homelands. Many did take part, attached to MacLachlans, MacLeans and Lochiel Camerons, who we also have strong associations with.

The diversity of the Clan today, is evidence of our Clan bonds and ties of friendship. There are close on 40 clans that we have links or bonds with, ranging from the MacDonalds Lords of the Isles, through to a small Clan, as an example with the Fletchers who are allied to MacGregors. Fletchers were known originally as arrow flighters. The greygoose feather's being fitted by them on to arrow shafts. Amongst the Clans noted as Archers are MacEwans, along with a host of Clans they are affiliated to.

Other notable connections are McEoins linked to MacFarlane Clan. The name MacCuine / McQuin, translates as MacKuen and MacQueen. The MacOwens are associated with MacEwans who have married into Campbell of Argyll families.

The Ewan and McEwans are connected to MacGregors.

All the names quoted above are interpretations of MacEwan names and their own local spellings amongst particular parish scribes. It goes without saying that all forms of MacEwan belong to, and stem from, the same sources.

I do hope this may answer or raise questions on the connections of Clan MacEwan. I'm also open to other people's opinions as to whether my information is complete and correct in all manner. If there are any glaringly obvious mistakes, they are entirely of my own making.

## ***THE CLAN MACEWEN, A CLAN IN ITS OWN RIGHT***

As a result of his historical research covering more than thirty years, Sir Iain Moncreiffe of that ilk produced the most authoritative and finest book on the Highland Clans. Also with the assistance of David Hicks, the Lyon conjectural tree.

Sir Iain had a very detailed grasp of Scottish genealogical matters and was considered to be one of the foremost experts in his field. Most would hesitate to disagree with anything that he has written.

In his book he states that the MacEwens was a Clan of considerable importance. Like the MacLachlans and the Lamonts they belonged to the mediaeval dynastic house of Cowal and Knapdale, sprung from the marriage of the local King's daughter to the Irish prince Anrothan, son of Aodh O'Neill, King of the North of Ireland (1030-1033).

The latter part of the Lyon Tree and his article on Clan MacEwen shows clearly a Clan of some importance.

Clan Societies should not be so enthusiastic to see their potential empires growing by a rather wonderful effort of imagination to include other Clan names as septs.

Our neighbours, the MacLachlans and the Lamonts, we wish them

EIGNU 'Slaves-Lord', King of Tara, living 380 (nicknamed from slave-raids on Roman Britain), was head of the pagan sacral Iron Age royal family of the Gaels, that descended from ritual incarnations of their ancestral god-spirit (Cunn 'of the Hundred Battles', and was associated with the sacrificial slaying (in combat) of the divine king by his successor within the dynastic family

NIALL 'of the Nine Hostages', High King of Ireland, living 400, asserted a titular sovereignty over all Ireland, his sons overthrowing Uldian power in the North

EUGAN, King of Ailech (in Northern Ireland), baptised personally by Saint Patrick, died 483

MUIREADAIN, King of Ailech, died c. 480

MUIRCHARTACH, High King of Ireland 512-534, burnt to death while drunk

DOMNALL 'the Deceitful', joint King of Ireland 583-586, died of plague

AEDN 'of the Ague', High King of Ireland 604-612

MAELFITHEO, King of Ailech 628-630

MAELDUIN, King of Ailech 671-681, killed in battle

FRGAL, High King of Ailech 710-722, killed in battle

NIALL 'of the Showers', High King of Ireland 763-770, died a monk at Iona 778

AEDN 'the Dignified', High King of Ireland 797-819

NIALL, High King of Ireland 833-846, drowned pursuing defeated Vikings

AEDN 'White-Hair', High King of Ireland 862-876 (married a daughter of Kenneth mac Alpin, King of Picts & Scots)

NIALL 'Black-Knee', High King of Ireland 916-919, killed in battle against Norse king of Dublin

MUIRCHERTACH 'of the Leather Cloaks', King of Ailech 938-943, Royal Heir of Ireland, killed in battle against Dublin


DOMNALL O'Neill, High King of Ireland 956-980, first Irishman to assume what became an hereditary surname

MUIRCHERTACH O'Neill, joint Royal Heir of Ireland, killed in battle against Norse king of Dublin 977

FLAITHBERTACH 'of the Pilgrim's Staff', King of Ailech 1004-1030 & 1033-1036 (went on Rome pilgrimage 1030)

AEDN 'the Handy', King of Ailech 1030-1033, Royal Heir of Ireland, died young


CONALL 'Gulban', King of Tir-conaill (whose descendants formed the Kindred of Saint Columba, including several Saints and the hereditary Abbots of Iona, Kells & Dunkeld; also the Kings of Scots 1034-1286)



DOMNALL, King of Ulster 'with opposition' (ancestor of the last High King of Ireland, slain 1260, also of the Earls of Tyrone and The O'Neills of Glannaboy, and of Terence O'Neill, present Prime Minister of Northern Ireland)

ANROTHAN, married the heiress of Conall & Knapdale (a princess of the royal house of Argyll, perhaps daughter of Suibne mac Kenneth who died 1041)

AEDN 'the Splendid' an Buirriche ('The Bull')

## ***SCOTS BANISHED TO THE AMERICAN PLANTATIONS***

**ANDREW McEWAN**, thief, banished August 1774

Transported by Shipmaster John Rankine. Landed at Port North, Potomack, Maryland, U.S.A., 17th October, 1775

**ARCHIBALD McEWAN**

Transported from Leith to Jamaica by John Ewing, August, 1685.

**DUNCAN McEWAN**

Covenanter, prisoner in Paul's work, Edinburgh. Transported from Leith to East New Jersey, U.S.A. by Robert Barclay of Urie, July, 1685.

**JOHN McEWAN**

Covenanter, captured at Crawfordmuir, prisoner at Cannongate, Dunnottar and Leith, banished to the Plantations. Transported from Leith, 5th September, 1685 to East New Jersey, U.S.A. on the *Henry and Francis*, Master Richard Hutton by George Scott of Pitlochrie.

**JOHN McEWAN**

Jacobite, captured at Preston. Transported from Liverpool on the *Godspeed*, Master Arthur Smith for Virginia, U.S.A., 28th July, 1716. Sold to John Fendall in Maryland, 17th October, 1716.

**KATHERINE McEWAN**

Fort William Jacobite prisoner at Carlisle and Lancaster. Transported from Liverpool on the *Johnson*, Master William Pemberton. Landed at Port Oxford, Maryland, U.S.A., 5th August, 1747.

## ***CLAN EWEN SOCIETY A.G.M.***

The Clan Ewen Society A.G.M. was held at the Isle of Skye Hotel, Perth on Saturday, 4th June, 1994 at 2.00 p.m.

The Chairman, Alan Ewing, welcomed members and friends and was pleased to see some new faces at the gathering - five people from the Perth area. A special welcome was given to Donald Ewing from South Australia, to Stanley and Anne MacEwen from Arkansas, U.S.A. and to Keith McEwen from Milton Keynes. Apologies were received from Douglas and Jean, Ipswich, John, Edinburgh and Robin, Inverness.

The minutes were read, approved and signed and the Treasurer and Secretary gave their report. The Membership Secretary gave an up-date on Clan membership numbers.

The Treasurer, Charles Ewen suggested an increase in the subscription was desirable - of £1.00 - however, after much discussion, it was unanimously agreed that an increase of £2.00 was more realistic.

Consequently, membership fees now are: Single, £7.00; Family, £9.00; Life Single, £65.00; Life Family, £90.00.

The purpose of the Clan Centre Account was another issue to be raised and several suggestions were made for its use and the decision of the meeting was to leave the matter for committee discussion and more definite ideas would be put forward at the next meeting.

Genealogist, Murdo, reported on some more pedigree charts returned and how some relationships had been made. Two additions to Clan merchandise were displayed - tartan braces / trouser suspenders and ear-rings.

The Chairman then paid tribute to the Bulletin Editor - Betty - who now wishes to demit office. Betty explained briefly her job and was thanked for her work on behalf of the Clan.

An appeal was made for a volunteer but so far with no results. The meeting continued with the election of office-bearers and as on previous occasions the present committee were unanimously re-elected.



## ***EOGAN'S STONE***


In the Abbey Museum on Iona where most of the ancient carved stones of Iona are placed for safety and preservation, there is No. 45 labelled Eogan's Stone.

It is a ringed cross with a circle at the foot and an inscription down the side.

***"Or (oit) ar an main Eogain"***  
which translates as "A prayer for the soul of Eogan (the modern Ewen is unknown) - on the back is a Latin cross so this stone was either re-used or more probably it stood upright about the 8th Century. One must speculate as to who this ancient Ewen was who had a stone erected for him on Iona!

Could he have been one of the Abbey monks?

## ***IRISH CHIEFTAIN***

A great Irish chieftain in his national dress: Sir Niall O'Neill, Second Baronet of Killeleagh, Lord Lieutenant of Armagh, who was mortally wounded as the Colonel of O'Neill's Dragoons, fighting for the Jacobite Cause at the battle of the Boyne in 1690.

His portrait by J. M. Wright in 1680 (now in the Tate Gallery, though a slightly different version of it is at Dunrobin Castle) is unique, in that it depicts a great Irish noble in the Erse costume of that period; with his 'wild Irish' fringed cloak, curious but beautifully adorned Erse apron, long red hose, pointed brogues, Celtic dirk, basket-hilted broadsword, great oval shield of studded red leather, gold-tipped black javelin, and elaborately-tooled red leather conical cap with the flowing plumes of an Irish chieftain.

Sir Niall descended in the direct male line from King Domnal 'the Young Ox' O'Neill, elder son of Aodh 'Athlone', King of the North of Ireland (1030-1033), whose younger son, Anrothan, was ancestor of the Highland Chiefs of Lamont, MacLachlan, MacNeil, MacEwen and other clans of Cowal and Knapdale in Scotland.



## ***DABNEY M. EWIN, M.D., F.A.C.S.***

For the third time Dabney returned to Scotland to teach. He was accompanied by his lovely wife Marilyn. During the weekend of May 14th-15th, he taught at a workshop for the Scottish branch of the British Society of Medical and Dental Hypnosis at Dunblane. Dabney had the honour of being invited by the Royal Society of Medicine to spend two weeks as Anglo-American Visiting Professor. As well as in Scotland he lectured in London, Stoke-on-Trent, and at Sheffield University.

Dabney is Clinical Professor, Surgery and Psychiatry, Tulane Medical School, and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, Louisiana State University Medical School.
